INTRODUCTION

After the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus, Peter went on to minister for 34 more years. During this period of time, Peter became fearless in his faith, he continued to learn about God, and he left an amazing legacy. The same person who once denied knowing Jesus was crucified for being a follower of Jesus. What can we learn from Peter's life after Jesus?

Monday: Acts 5:27-32

All of the apostles are arrested for preaching about Jesus after being warned to never say his name again. With all boldness Peter preaches about Jesus again in front of the high priest and council. In what situations could you be bolder in saying something when it would be easier to say nothing at all? In what situations could you be bolder in taking advantage of existing opportunities? In what situations could you be bolder in creating new opportunities?

Tuesday: Acts 5:40-42

Our first-century forefathers rejoiced when they were persecuted in Jesus' name. To have suffered, to have lost something, to have given up something, to be disfigured because of the name of Jesus is something they were proud of. We live in a country where we have religious freedom but we shy away from telling others about our faith. Why is it easier to practice "safe" Christianity? How do you know when being "bold" becomes over-the-top?

Wednesday: Acts 10:1-29

Verses 27-28 of the story suggest that meeting a large group of Gentiles eager to hear the gospel was his "aha!" moment. Have you ever had a contact or experience that broke through some prejudice of yours, and opened your eyes to God's inclusive mission in the world?

Thursday: Acts 10:34-48

This successful evangelistic trip at first earned Peter some criticism (cf. Acts 11:1-3). God's mission was to all people from the beginning (cf. Genesis 12:1-3), but over time many of God's people had come to believe it was about them, not everyone. How ready are you to rejoice when you hear about great success for some congregation, ministry or denomination other than your own?

Friday: 2 Timothy 1:5-14

After once denying Jesus, Peter was no longer ashamed of Jesus or his message. In Timothy's second letter we are repeatedly warned against being ashamed of the gospel. What factors, if any, cause you to feel a "spirit of timidity" about sharing what Jesus means in your life? What, if anything, helps you to overcome that timidity?

MOVING FORWARD

Peter's ministry after the ascension of Jesus was marked with boldness, not secrecy. Rather than being a safe believer, he looked for opportunities to be bold. That's where God showed up. So, be bold. Speak up. Take advantage of opportunities God gives you. Create opportunities to be bold. And be a part of the difference Christ can make in people's lives. Then you too will create a legacy like Peter.
